


Ambassador Skills and Qualifications

While the duties of an ambassador can vary, their primary focus is on diplomacy and representing their country abroad. Most ambassadors have at least a bachelor's degree, Foreign Service experience, and the following skills:

- **Diplomacy** the ambassador's role is primarily diplomatic in nature, so the ability to successfully manage foreign relations and support positive interactions between nations is a necessity
- **Negotiation skills** because they frequently lead negotiations on a variety of topics, ambassadors need to be pragmatic and skilled negotiators with a solid understanding of their nation's positions and interests
- **Relationship building** ambassadors build relationships with foreign leaders and diplomats, so the ability to develop and maintain positive relations is a major benefit in this position
- Personnel management ambassadors oversee and direct Foreign Service personnel and support other agencies in their host countries, so they need to be effective and impactful leaders
- Conflict resolution closely related to the ability to negotiate to advance their country's interests, ambassadors frequently play a vital role in resolving or preventing international conflicts

What does the Bible say about anointing oil?"

Anointing oil, mentioned 20 times in Scripture, was used in the Old Testament for pouring on the head of the high priest and his descendants and sprinkling the tabernacle and its furnishings to mark them as holy and set apart to the Lord (Exodus 25:6; Leviticus 8:30; Numbers 4:16). Three times it is called the "holy, anointing oil," and the Jews were strictly forbidden from reproducing it for personal use (Exodus 30:32–33). The recipe for anointing oil is found in Exodus 30:23–24; it contained myrrh, cinnamon and other natural ingredients. There is no indication that the oil or the ingredients had any supernatural power. Rather, the strictness of the guidelines for creating the oil was a test of the obedience of the Israelites, a demonstration of the absolute holiness of God.

Only five New Testament passages refer to the practice of anointing with oil, and none of them offer an explanation for its use. We can draw our conclusions from context. In <u>Matthew 6:17</u> Jesus mentions the everyday practice of anointing oneself with oil. In <u>Mark 6:13</u> the disciples anoint the sick and heal them. In <u>Mark 14:3-9</u> Mary anoints Jesus' feet as an act of worship. In <u>James 5:14</u> the church elders anoint the sick with oil for healing. In <u>Hebrews 1:8-9</u> God says to Christ as He returns triumphantly to heaven, "Your throne, O God, will last for ever and ever," and God anoints Jesus "with the oil of gladness."

Most likely the use of oil, as reflected in this passage, was a symbolic act. In Bible times the practice of anointing with oil was frequently representative of God's approval (see 1 Sam. 10:1; Psa. 89:20). Many biblical scholars are fairly confident, therefore, that the application of oil in James 5:14 was a symbolic act invoked in conjunction with supernatural healing.

Should Christians use anointing oil today? There is nothing in Scripture that commands or even suggests that we should use similar oil today, but neither is there anything to forbid it. Oil is often used as a symbol for the Holy Spirit in the Bible as in the Parable of the Wise and Foolish Virgins (Matthew 25:1-13). Christians have the Spirit who leads us into all truth and "anoints" us continually with His grace and comfort. "But you have an anointing from the Holy One, and all of you know the truth" (1 John 2:20).





What is the purpose of The Tallit?

A tallit (also called tallit gadol or by its Yiddish name, tallis) is a Jewish prayer shawl worn by men and women during morning prayer services and on the Sabbath and on holidays. They are used to prepare the mind and heart for prayer and inspire elation and reverence for God. Like yarmulkes, Jewish prayer shawls or tallit can be very simple or very complex in design. A vibrantly decorated wool or silk tallit can reflect specific symbols, stories, places and events in Jewish culture or simply indicate states such as contemplation or celebration. The only requirements of Jewish tallit construction are that it be a shawl long enough to be worn over the shoulders, as a garment and that it not be made of a combination of wool and linen. Many women choose to wear silk tallit, which are lightweight and often decorated with gorgeous detail.


Many Jewish tallit feature the Hebrew blessing for donning a tallit across the atarah (the long side that lays closest to the neck). One quirk to note: Since sacred writings are not permitted to be taken into a bathroom, if the blessing is written on your tallit, you'll have to remove it (and most likely hang it on a nearby tallit rack) before proceeding into the restroom!

Religious Significance of a Jewish Tallit

The religious significance of Jewish tallit lies not in itself, but in the specifically-detailed fringes, or tzitzit, that are tied to each corner based on a passage in the Torah (Numbers 15:37-41) instructing wearers of "four-cornered garments" to do so in order to remember God's commandments. Because they are exempt from any mitzvah that involves time constraints and considered innately closer to God by their very nature, women are not required to wear a tallit as a preparation for prayer or reminder of their faith. Therefore, wearing a Jewish tallit is a woman's personal choice based on her own desire for contemplation and expression of reverence.

The Blessing for Donning a Jewish Tallit

Hold the tallit outstretched in both hands and recite the blessing before throwing the tallit across your shoulders and briefly covering your head and face with your hands. The blessing in Hebrew is "Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam asher kidishanu b'mitz'votav v'tzivanu l'hit'ateif ba-tzitzit." ("Blessed are you, Lord, our God, sovereign of the universe, Who has sanctified us with His commandments and commanded us to wrap ourselves in the tzitzit.") Once the blessing is said, the tallit is thrown and the head is covered, you can then adjust the tallit as needed over your shoulders.

We believe that man was created in the image of God, before whom he walked in holiness and purity, but that by voluntary disobedience and transgression (violation of a law, rule, command), he fell from the Eden of purity and innocence to the depths of sin and iniquity (**wickedness, sinfulness, grossly immoral acts,**), and that in consequence of this, all mankind are sinners sold unto Satan. Sinners not by constraint but by choice shaped in iniquity and utterly void by nature of that holiness required by the law of God. Positively inclined to evil, quality and without excuse justly deserving the condemnation of a just and holy God.

Ch: 2 V.15 (6) to obey God by abstaining from eating the forbidden fruit. Adam's failure under this covenant results in his expulsion from the garden and in the fall of the human race from a state of innocence into a condition characterized by sin Ch: 3 V.15



God's Plan For Man's Redemption





Baptism

In the New Testament, baptism was practiced by John the Baptist and Jesus' disciples, and commanded by Jesus himself (see Matthew 28:16-20) as a permanent ritual, or sacrament, that would introduce people into the Christian church. Those who are baptized are considered Christians.

Baptism itself is a ritual of *cleansing*. As originally practiced, it involved being fully immersed in flowing water such as the Jordan River. In non-religious terms, baptism is a bath. The purpose of a bath physically is to clean the body of dirt and impurities.

Spiritually, therefore, baptism represents the cleansing of a person from evil, falsity, and sin. This is the first step in the process of being born again, or spiritual rebirth.

That is why baptism is presented in the New Testament as "the baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (see Matthew 3:11; Mark 1:4; Luke 3:3; Acts 2:38, 13:24, 19:4). Baptism is not about mere *physical* cleansing; it is a ritual symbolic of the *spiritual* cleansing of repentance from our sins, and thereby accepting God's forgiveness, entering into the Christian religion, and being born again as a new creation in Christ (see 2 Corinthians 5:17).

In Christianity, baptism takes the place of all the Old Testament rituals of washing and purification.

Luke 3:16 and Matthew 3:11 speak of three forms of baptism:

Baptism with water - Baptism with The Holy spirit - Baptism with Fire

Since baptism in generally represents a cleansing of Christian believers from evil, falsity, and sin, each of these forms of baptism represent a cleansing at a different level of a Christian's

life

(John 14:16,17 / Acts 1:5-8 / 1 Corinthians 3:16) (Luke 3:16 / Mark 1:8-9 / Mathew 3:11 / John 1:33)



The Church Is The Bride Of Christ

The imagery and symbolism of marriage is applied to Christ and the body of believers known as the church. The church is comprised of those who have trusted in Jesus Christ as their personal Savior and have received eternal life. Christ, the <u>Bridegroom</u>, has sacrificially and lovingly chosen the church to be His bride (<u>Ephesians 5:25–27</u>). Just as there was a betrothal period in biblical times during which the bride and groom were separated until the wedding, so is the bride of Christ separate from her Bridegroom during the church age. Her responsibility during the betrothal period is to be faithful to Him (<u>2 Corinthians 11:2</u>; <u>Ephesians 5:24</u>). At the <u>rapture</u>, the church will be united with the Bridegroom and the official "wedding ceremony" will take place and, with it, the eternal union of Christ and His bride will be actualized (<u>Revelation 19:7–9</u>; <u>21:1–2</u>).

"The Bride Groom"

A bridegroom is a man just married or just about to be married. A bridegroom is the male version of a bride, a woman who is just married or just about to be married. The word *bridegroom* comes from the Old English *brydguma*, which was a combination of *bryd* ("bride") and *guma* ("man"). The word *bridegroom* appears in the Bible in both Testaments and carries the same meaning: the husband of the bride.

The word *bridegroom* is used often in the Bible as a metaphor for God, specifically for Jesus Christ. The church is likened to a bride with Christ as her bridegroom. When Jesus was with His disciples, He answered a question about fasting with an analogy involving a bridegroom: "How can the guests of the bridegroom fast while he is with them? They cannot, so long as they have him with them. But the time will come when the bridegroom will be taken from them, and on that day they will fast" (Mark 2:19–20).

Jesus is the bridegroom, and His disciples are the wedding guests. <u>John the Baptist</u> presented himself as the "friend who attends the bridegroom," which is the person we would today call the "best man" (<u>John 3:29</u>). John said,

"The bride belongs to the bridegroom," and by this he referred to Jesus and the church, His spiritual bride, who stands by His side and invites people in, saying, "Come!' Let the one who is thirsty come; and let the one who wishes take the free gift of the water of life" (<u>Revelation 22:17</u>).



This church—the <u>Bride of Christ</u>—is not one specific local church or denomination but the entire body of believers throughout the ages. All who have trusted the Lord and received salvation by grace through faith are collectively His Bride. This analogy exists in several New Testament passages. Paul gives believers instructions about marriage, saying, "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her" (Ephesians 5:25). Paul also refers to the church as a virgin waiting for her bridegroom (2 Corinthians 11:2) and uses the relationship between Christ and the church as an example of the importance of wives' submission to their husbands (Ephesians 5:24).

The <u>New Jerusalem</u> is also referred to "as a bride beautifully dressed for her husband" in <u>Revelation 21:2</u>, another passage that alludes to Christ as a bridegroom (verse 9).

In the eternal state, believers will have access to the heavenly city known as <u>New Jerusalem</u>, also called "the holy city" in <u>Revelation 21:2</u> and <u>10</u> The New Jerusalem is not the church, but it takes on some of the church's characteristics. In his vision of the end of the age, the apostle John sees the city coming down from heaven adorned "as a bride," meaning that the city will be gloriously radiant and the inhabitants of the city, the redeemed of the Lord, will be holy and pure, wearing white garments of holiness and righteousness.

Some have misinterpreted verse 9 to mean the holy city is the bride of Christ, but that cannot be because Christ died for His people, not for a city. The city is called the bride because it encompasses all who are the bride, just as all the students of a school are sometimes called "the school."

Believers in Jesus Christ are the bride of Christ, and we wait with great anticipation for the day when we will be united with our Bridegroom. Until then, we remain faithful to Him and say with all the redeemed of the Lord, "Come, Lord Jesus!" (<u>Revelation 22:20</u>).







The Body of Christ Facts

The phrase "the Body of Christ" is a common New Testament metaphor for the Church (all those who are truly saved). The Church is called "one body in Christ" in <u>Romans 12:5</u>, "one body" in <u>1 Corinthians 10:17</u>, "the body of Christ" in <u>1 Corinthians 12:27</u> and <u>Ephesians 4:12</u>, and "the body" in <u>Hebrews 13:3</u>. The Church is clearly equated with "the body" of Christ in <u>Ephesians 5:23</u> and <u>Colossians 1:24</u>.

When Christ entered our world, He took on a physical body "prepared" for Him (<u>Hebrews</u> <u>10:5</u>; <u>Philippians 2:7</u>). Through His physical body, Jesus demonstrated the love of God clearly, tangibly, and boldly—especially through His sacrificial death on the cross (<u>Romans 5:8</u>). After His bodily ascension, Christ continues His work in the world through those He has redeemed the Church now demonstrates the love of God clearly, tangibly, and boldly. In this way, the Church functions as "the Body of Christ."

The Church may be called the Body of Christ because of these facts:

1) Members of the Body of Christ are joined to Christ in salvation (Ephesians 4:15-16).

2) Members of the Body of Christ follow Christ as their Head (Ephesians 1:22-23).

3) Members of the Body of Christ are the physical representation of Christ in this world. The Church is the organism through which Christ manifests His life to the world today.

4) Members of the Body of Christ are indwelt by the Holy Spirit of Christ (Romans 8:9).



5) Members of the Body of Christ possess a diversity of gifts suited to particular functions (<u>1</u> <u>Corinthians 12:4-31</u>). "The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ" (verse 12).


6) Members of the Body of Christ share a common bond with all other Christians, regardless of background, race, or ministry. "There should be no division in the body, but . . . its parts should have equal concern for each other" (<u>1 Corinthians 12:25</u>).

7) Members of the Body of Christ are secure in their salvation (<u>John 10:28-30</u>). For a Christian to lose his salvation, God would have to perform an "amputation" on the Body of Christ!

8) Members of the Body of Christ partake of Christ's death and resurrection (Colossians 2:12).

9) Members of the Body of Christ share Christ's inheritance (Romans 8:17).

10) Members of the Body of Christ receive the gift of Christ's righteousness (Romans 5:17).





For mental healing"

- Pulling down strongholds in the mind. You have given us weapons with divine power to utterly destroy strongholds. We demolish arguments and every lie that sets itself up against the knowledge of You, and we take every thought captive to make it obedient to Christ. <u>2 Cor. 10:3-5</u>
- The devil is a liar. He blinded the minds of those who are perishing and placed (<u>John 8:44; 2 Cor.</u> <u>4:4; 2 Cor. 11:3</u>)
- Renewing of their minds so they are able to agree with the Lord's good and perfect will. (<u>Rom.</u> <u>12:2</u>)

Who Is <u>satan</u> In The Scriptures?

He is constantly represented in the Bible as a **personal entity**. Personal names and personal pronouns as well as personal acts are so frequently attributed to him that it is impossible to view Satan as the mere **personification** of evil.

The great enemy of God is most commonly referred to in the Bible as "the devil" or "Satan." He is termed the devil thirty-three times in the New Testament, and called Satan thirty-six times.

But he is also designated by many other titles. He is:

- Abaddon, Apollyon, the great dragon, the old serpent, the deceiver of the whole world (Rev. 9: 11; 12:9),
- the adversary (1 Pet. 5:8),
- the accuser of our brethren (Rev. 12:10),
- Beelzebub (Mt. 12:24),
- Belial (2 Cor. 6:15),
- an enemy (Mt. 13:28),
- the evil one (Mt. 13:19),
- the father of lies, a liar, a murderer (Jn. 8:44),
- the god of this world (2 Cor. 4:4),
- the ruler of this world (Jn. 12:31),
- the prince of the power of the air (Eph. 2:2), and,
- the tempter (Mt. 4:3).





Why did God create a Devil?

In my<u>last post</u> I looked at the account of the Fall of man. The book of Genesis records Satan (which means 'accuser') in the guise of a serpent orchestrating this tragedy. But this raises an important question: Why would God create a 'bad' *devil* (which means 'adversary') to corrupt His good creation?

Lucifer – The Shining One

In fact the Bible records that God actually created a powerful, intelligent, and beautiful angelic being (the chief among all angels) called Lucifer (meaning 'Shining One') – and that he was very good. But Lucifer also had a will with which he could freely choose. A passage in Isaiah 14 records the choice before him.

How you have fallen from heaven, morning star, son of the dawn! You have been cast down to the earth, you who once laid low the nations! You said in your heart, "I will ascend to the heavens; I will raise my throne above the stars of God; I will sit enthroned on the mount of assembly, on the utmost heights of the North. I will ascend above the tops of the clouds; I will make myself like the Most High." (Isaiah 14:12-14)

Lucifer, <u>like Adam</u>, had a choice. He could accept that God was God or he could choose to decide that he would be god unto himself. His repeated "I wills" show that he chose to defy God and declared himself to be 'Most High'. A passage in Ezekiel gives a parallel account of the fall of Lucifer



You were in Eden, the garden of God. ... I ordained and anointed vou as the mighty angelic guardian. You had access to the holy mountain of God and walked among the stones of fire. "You were blameless in all you did from the day you were created until the day evil was found in you. ... and you sinned. So I banished you in disgrace from the mountain of God. I expelled you, O mighty guardian, from your place among the stones of fire. Your heart was filled with pride because of all your beauty. Your wisdom was corrupted by your love of splendor. So I threw you to the ground. (Ezekiel 28:13-17)

Lucifer's beauty, wisdom and might – all the good things <u>created in him by God</u> – led him to pride. His pride led to his rebellion and fall, but he never lost (and thus still retains) any of his power and traits. He is leading a cosmic revolt <u>against his Creator</u> to see who will be God. His strategy was to enlist mankind to join him – by tempting them to succumb to the same choice that he made <u>– to love themselves, become autonomous from God, and defy Him.</u> The heart of the <u>test of Adam's will</u> was the same as Lucifer's; it was just arrayed with a different garb. They both chose to be 'god' to themselves. This was (and is) the ultimate <u>'god delusion'</u>.

Satan - working through others

The passage in Isaiah is directed to the 'King of Babylon' and the Ezekiel passage is addressed to the 'King of Tyre'. But from the descriptions given, it is obvious that no human is addressed. The "I wills" in Isaiah describe a being who was cast to the earth in punishment for wanting to place his throne above the stars of God. The passage in Ezekiel addresses one who is an 'angelic guardian' who once moved in Eden and the 'mountain of God'. This tendency of Satan (or Lucifer) to position himself behind or through someone else is consistent. In the Genesis fall he speaks through the serpent. In Isaiah he rules through the King of Babylon, and in Ezekiel he possesses the King of Tyre.



Why did Lucifer revolt against God?

But why would Lucifer want to defy and usurp the rule of the One omniscient and omnipotent Creator? An important aspect of being 'smart' is to know whether or not you can defeat a potential opponent. Lucifer may have had (and still has) power, but even his limited creature-power would have been insufficient for a successful revolt against His Creator. So why risk all and go for something he could not win? I would think that a 'smart' angel would have recognized his limitations pitted against Omniscience & Omnipotence combined – and held back his revolt? So why didn't he? This question puzzled me for many years.

What helped me was to realize that Lucifer could only come to the conclusion that God was His omnipotent Creator by faith – the same as for us. Let me explain. The Bible associates the origin of angels with the first week of creation. We see this in Isaiah 14 above, but this is consistent through the Bible. So for example a creation passage in Job tells us:

Then the LORD spoke to Job out of the storm. He said... "Where were you when I laid the earth's foundation? Tell me, if you understand.... while the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy? (Job 38:1-7)

Picture Lucifer being created and becoming conscious sometime in creation week, somewhere in the cosmos. All he knows is that now he exists and is self-aware, and there is also another Being who *claims* to have created him and all the cosmos. But how does Lucifer know that this claim is true? Perhaps, this alleged creator popped into existence in the cosmos just before Lucifer had popped into existence. And because this 'creator' arrived earlier on the scene, so to speak, he was (perhaps) more powerful and (perhaps) more knowledgeable than he was – but then again perhaps not. Could it be that both he and the alleged creator had both popped into existence? Lucifer could only accept God's Word to him that He had created Him and that God himself was eternal and infinite. And in his pride he chose to believe the fantasy that he had birthed in his own mind.

You might think it fanciful that Lucifer would believe that both he and God (and the other angels) just 'popped' into existence. But this is the *same* basic idea behind the latest and greatest of modern cosmology. There was a cosmic fluctuation of nothing – and then out of this fluctuation arose the universe – that is the essence of modern atheistic cosmological speculations. Fundamentally, everyone – from Lucifer to Richard Dawkins & Stephen Hawkings to you & I must decide **by faith** whether the universe is self-contained or was brought forth and is sustained **by The Creator Jesus Christ**.



In other words, seeing is *not* believing. Lucifer would have seen and conversed with God. But he still would have had to accept 'by faith' that God had created him. Many people say that if God would just 'appear' to them then they would believe. But through the Bible, many people saw and heard God – that was never the issue. But the crux of the issue was whether they would accept and trust His Word about Himself and themselves. From Adam & Eve, to Cain & Abel, to Noah, to the Egyptians at the first Passover, to the Israelite crossing of the Red Sea all the way to those who saw the miracles of Jesus – 'seeing' never resulted in trust. The fall of Lucifer is consistent with this.

What is the Devil doing today?

<u>So God did not make a 'bad devil', but created a powerful and intelligent angelic being who</u> <u>through his pride has led a revolt against God</u> – and in so doing was corrupted (while still retaining) his original splendor. You, I, and all of mankind have become part of the battleground in this contest between God and his 'adversary' (devil). The strategy on the part of the devil is not to go about in sinister black cloaks like the 'Black Riders' in the Lord of the Rings and put evil curses on us, but with his retained splendor he simply seeks to deceive us from the redemption that God has signaled at the <u>beginning of time</u>, through <u>Abraham</u>, through <u>Moses</u>, and then accomplished in the death and <u>resurrection of Jesus</u>. As the Bible says:



Satan himself masquerades as an angel of light. It is not surprising, then, if his servants also masquerade as servants of righteousness. (2 Corinthians 11:14-15)



Satan in the Old Testament

The Hebrew term **satan** etymologically denoted "adversary," being related to a verb suggesting the idea of "lying in wait." The word was frequently used in a very general sense of adversary.

Satan in the Garden

Our first knowledge of Satan is derived from the temptation account in Genesis. Numerous attempts to refute the historicity of this narrative have been attempted. Professor Melancthon Jacobus speaks to this very point:

"That there was a real serpent in this transaction cannot be doubted any more than we can doubt the real history throughout. Here, where the facts speak, further explanations are not necessary, nor fitted to the time of the beginning. (1) The real serpent is contrasted with the other animals, (vs. 1). (2) In the New Testament allusion is made to a real serpent in referring to the history, (2 Cor. 11:3, 14; 1 Jn. 3:8; Rev. 20:2). Yet (3) that there was in the transaction a superior agent, Satan himself, who only made use of the serpent, is plain from his being referred to as 'the Old Serpent, called the Devil and Satan,' (Rev. 12:9) — 'a murderer from the beginning,' (Jn. 8:44). Satan is also spoken of as the arch seducer, who is even transformed into an angel of light,' (2 Cor. 11: 14). The reference may be to this event. Almost all the Asiatic nations hold the serpent to be a wicked being that has brought evil into the world.







Satan in the New Testament

Satan Tempted Christ

As the serpent seduced Eve (Gen. 3:6) through the manifold channels of lust of the flesh, lust of the eye, and the vainglory of life (1 Jn. 2:16), so he sought to solicit Christ to sin similarly (Mt. 4:1-11).

Interestingly, he is denominated "the tempter" in that narrative. The Greek term is peirazon, a present tense participle literally expanded, "the always tempting me," which suggests his characteristic activity.

Had the devil succeeded in causing Christ to sin, the Lord could not have served as the spotless sin offering (2 Pet. 1:19; 2 Cor. 5:21), and the entire human race would have been forever lost!

Satan's Affliction on Mankind

Disease, infirmity and death are ultimately the responsibility of Satan. How? By his introduction of sin into the world, he brought about such woes and hence, he is really the murderer of the human family (Jn. 8:44).

This is why it is said that a certain Jewish woman, who had been afflicted with an infirmity for eighteen years, was bound of Satan (Lk. 13:16), and Peter declared that Jesus went about doing good "healing all that were oppressed of the devil" (Acts 10:38).





Satan: Enemy of the Apostles

The New Testament represents the devil as a deadly foe of the apostles of Christ, who by their saving message, opposed his work.

The Lord informed Peter: "Simon, Simon, behold, Satan asked to have you, that he might sift you as wheat" (Lk. 22:31).

Many commentators have over-looked the fact that the pronoun "you" (humas) is plural, revealing that Jesus was issuing a warning regarding all the apostles. Yet, recognizing the special weakness of Peter, the Master adds: "but I made supplication for thee (sou, singular) that thy faith fail not"

Moreover, Paul's thorn in the flesh was a "messenger of Satan" (2 Cor. 12:7), and when the apostle would have visited the Thessalonian brethren, Satan hindered him (2 Thes. 2: 18).

You must ALWAY'S remember that the devil can only do what he is permitted to do by God.





The promise of Genesis 3:15 will then be totally fulfilled: "He [the woman's seed, i.e., Christ] shall bruise thy [the serpent's] head."

Satan is not Deity

It is certainly clear that Satan is not of the nature of deity. Deity is all powerful (Gen. 17:1). Deity cannot be restrained (Job 42:2).

On the contrary, however, the devil is clearly not omnipotent as evidenced by the following:

- His power to afflict was limited (Job 1:12; 2:6).
- When rebuked by the messenger of Jehovah, he had to remain silent (Zech. 3:2).
- His authority over world kingdoms was "delivered" to him (Lk.4:6).
- He had to ask for the apostles (Lk. 22:31).
- He can "snatch" no one from the Lord's hand (Jn. 10:28).
- When resisted, he flees (Jas. 4:7).
- When cast into hell he will be powerless to resist (Rev. 20:10).

Moreover, Scripture plainly affirms that He that is in us (i.e., God) is greater than he (i.e., Satan) that is in the world. (1 Jn. 4:4).

So, to sum up: Deity is all powerful. But Satan is not. Thus, he is not of the deity class.





The Beginning Of The End

Satan was created

"[F]or in him were all things created, in the heavens and upon the earth, things visible and things invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers" (Col. 1:16).

This would include Satan as he originally was. It might be mentioned also at this point that all created things had their origin at some time during the creation week of Genesis 1. This Moses states in Exodus 20:11:

"For in six days Jehovah made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is" This included the great host of angels. Incidentally, the angels:

"must have been created at the very beginning of the first day of creation, for Job 38:6, 7 tells of their singing and of their shout of joy at the creation of the earth" (Whitcomb 1972, 43).



Michael's war with Satan

In Revelation 12:7-9 John sees a vision of war in heaven between Michael and his angels and the devil and his angels, the result being that Satan was cast down to earth (this will happen in the middle of the 7 year tribulation).



Satan's Mission

The devil's self-appointed mission, very simply stated, is to destroy the human race in hell. It is little wonder he has been denominated by inspiration as the "Destroyer" (Rev. 9:11).

He attempted the ruin of humanity by the temptation of Christ (Mt. 4:1-11), and the seduction of His holy apostles (Lk. 22:31).





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
